GENERAL RULES

This flower show DOES NOT conform to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The *Handbook for Flower Shows* (HB) 2017 Edition, with revisions printed in *The National Gardener* Magazine (TNG), is the authority for all issues not covered by the Schedule, which is the Law of the Show. All Page numbers refer to pages in The *Handbook for Flower Shows* (HB) 2017 Edition.

HORTICULTURE ENTRIES

The TOTAL number of exhibits is NOT TO EXCEED five (5) PER PERSON, (with exceptions listed below) to allow the judges enough time to judge.

Exceptions:

- a) Entries for Section J, Invasive Species DO NOT COUNT towards the five allowed specimens/person. You may bring in an unlimited number (within reason!) of invasive species entries.
- b) Entries for Section M, Mothers and Daughters, the pair of Mother and Daughter counts as ONE entry.
- c) Entries for Section Q, Herb collections of 5 cuttings in 5 individual containers count as ONE entry.
- d) The horticulture chairs reserve the right to INCREASE the number of allowed entries via email notification to the garden club, at our discretion.

You are encouraged to bring in your "best" five (5) specimens—you may create more than five (5) on-line entries (to allow for specimens that are imperfect the day of the show), but you may only actually bring in NO MORE THAN FIVE (5) specimens, with the exceptions noted above.

ON-LINE REGISTRATION OF ALL HORTICULTURE ENTRIES IS REQUIRED. REGISTRATION WILL CLOSE AT MIDNIGHT, SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 2019 NO WALK- IN or LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED

Please enter any horticulture which you think may be ready for the show.

There is no penalty for withdrawing material that is not show ready.

HORTICULTURE AWARDS

BRANFORD GARDEN CLUB

Valedictorian Award: One is offered and may be awarded to the highest scoring correctly named blue-ribbon winner in the entire Horticulture Division. Winner may choose three Branford Garden Club photo cards.

Salutatorian Award: One is offered and may be awarded to the second highest scoring correctly named blue-ribbon winner in the entire Horticulture Division. Winner may choose two Branford Garden Club photo cards

The Best of the "F's" Award: One is offered and may be awarded to the highest scoring correctly named blue-ribbon winner of Invasive Species, Section J. This is a commiseration award, as we are very sorry that you have such a perfect specimen of an invasive in your yard. Winner may choose one Branford Garden Club photo card.

Teacher's Pet Award: May be given in Sections A, B, C, D, E, O, P, Q, and R to a correctly named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 points or more.

Varsity Squad Award: Awarded to the cut arboreal exhibit which is the correctly named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Sections F, G, H, and I.

Jayvee Squad Award: Awarded to the correctly named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above for container-grown plants in Sections K, L, M and N.

HORTICULTURE RULES

- 1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 6, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division. The rules for a single species cut or container-grown specimen are listed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows* or its supplement, *Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging*.
- 2. To receive a Branford Garden Club award, the exhibitor must identify her/his entry by its binomial name (Genus, species, and cultivar, if known) or currently acceptable scientific designation. Consult Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 6, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division Chapter 6. To help with naming, use http://www.missouribotanicalgarden.org/. In the Search box (upper right corner of screen), enter the common name of the specimen to get a list of botanical names—click on the botanical name link to check if that is your specimen. Note: Many dahlias are only listed as Dahlia 'Cultivar', as the species name is not listed on purchase labels.
- 3. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line, except for *Gladiolus*.
- 4. All Entries must be fresh and grown by the exhibitor, or your neighbor with the green thumb!, or a guest to the in-house Horticulture show. But please do not bring in something that you have just purchased at a garden center.
- 5. Exhibitors may make more than one entry per class provided each is of a different cultivar, color, or type.
- 6. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the 'Any Other Worthy' Class.
- 7. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as a foliage plant, if grown for their leaves.
- 8. We will have a very limited selection of specimen bottles available, so if possible, PLEASE PROVIDE YOUR OWN CLEAR, COLORLESS BOTTLES (glass or plastic) for your cut specimens. You may use plastic wrap, pieces of cut celery (fit the stem of the specimen into the concavity of the celery, then into the bottle) or other unobtrusive materials of your choice to wedge the specimens in the bottles. If necessary, provide weighting (small rocks or marbles) in the bottom of the bottles-do not bury the cut end of the specimen in the weighting material—the cut end needs to be visible. Evergreen specimens (Sections G and I) will be displayed by laying on the table and WILL NOT USE BOTTLES. The Horticulture Committee will provide paper plates for vegetables and fruits. Containers (for container grown plants) furnished by the exhibitor should be clean and should harmonize with, not detract from, the plant material. Discreet double potting is allowed.
- 9. PLEASE (if possible) PREPARE YOUR CUT SPECIMENS AT HOME AND BRING THEM ALREADY IN THEIR DISPLAY BOTTLES TO THE MEETING—WE HAVE LIMITED SPACE FOR SPECIMEN PREPARATION IN THE MEETING ROOM and limited time as well.
- 10. All Entries must be well groomed. Diseased or insect infected plant material will not be accepted. Water thoroughly before bringing entries to the show. TLC will be given to all specimens.
- 11. Plant material must be in its natural state and may not be altered by application of oil or commercial "shine" products. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
- 12. Only foliage and/or flowers naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted. Unattached foliage is never included with a cut bloom specimen.
- 13. Specimens should be brought to our meeting room at the Branford Fire Station on Main Street, from 10:30 am to 11:15 am, Thursday, September 5, 2019. You will receive the horticulture entry card (containing your on-line registration information) for your specimens when you arrive.

Invasive specimens do not count towards the maximum of five (5) allowed specimens/person. You may bring in an unlimited (within reason!) number of invasive specimens.

Invasive plants are NEVER allowed in a Federated Garden Club Flower Show. However, because of interest generated at the June 2019 meeting, a section is being included for educational purposes. Please transport your invasive specimens responsibly (if seeding, placed in a box or bag) so that you do not spread your unwanted invasive elsewhere in town.
